Hollywood Beautification Project

Three students in the Master of Arts in Education and Teaching Credential program were awarded a \$10,000 grant from the City of Los Angeles for a Hollywood neighborhood beautification project.

As part of a program requirement for the Social Change Project in the Teacher Education curriculum at GSEP, Fernando Ibarra, Tina Jung and Perry Yook, who student teach at the Santa Monica Boulevard Community Charter School, along with Dr. Eugene Kim, will oversee the use of the grant to repaint the school buildings, purchase benches for a parent waiting area, place trash receptacles in the neighborhood and landscape around the school grounds.

"The Social Change Project requires students to take leadership of a project that will impact the community in a way that is collaborative and lasting," said Kim.

The Santa Monica Boulevard Community Charter School, which was founded in 1910, is located across the street from Paramount Studios and is one of several GSEP Professional Development Schools. As a result of this grant, other student-teacher teams at Santa Monica Boulevard Community Charter School are looking into various grants for their Social Change Projects. ■

To commemorate the milestone, the 35th Anniversary Scholarship Fund was announced, through which all tax deductible gifts made to GSEP during the anniversary year will be awarded to students. Also announced was the Jan and Robert Davidson Endowed Professorship, established to recognize academic excellence and scholarship in educational technology. The Davidson's developed computer software to support education in kindergarten through high school and today are engaged in supporting gifted young people through their foundation, the Davidson Institute for Talent Development. The first endowed professorship was awarded to Dr. Linda Polin, GSEP professor of education.

Following the 35th anniversary dedications, the highly esteemed Dr. Miroslav Volf was introduced to an audience of many different faiths. Volf is the author of numerous books on diversity from a faith-based perspective and is the Henry B. Wright Professor of Systematic Theology at Yale Divinity School and Director of the Yale Center for Faith and Culture. Volf is an internationally recognized human-rights advocate, who has vigorously promoted peace in the Serbian-Croatian conflict. which continues to take place in his homeland of Croatia. A question and answer period followed Volf's presentation and the celebration concluded with the showing of a short film on the school's 35-year history.
